Prevention

Alcohol and other drug youth coalitions and leadership activities, public education/awareness, school programs, community events

Treatment (Early Intervention/Outpatient/Intensive Outpatient) Youth & Adult: screening/assessment, individual and group treatment, referral to residential/detox, DUII services. co-occurring disorders treatment*. Gambling addiction treatment. Bi-lingual services

Detox and residential services: referrals to Eastern Oregon Alcoholism Foundation and other providers statewide

Recovery

Umatilla County Community Corrections contracts with Eastern Oregon Alcoholism Foundation for services in Hermiston and Pendleton and with Umatilla County Addictions Program for services in Milton-Freewater. The County uses the Matrix Treatment Program. There is no waiting list for this program, clients are welcomed to treatment and the groups are open-ended. The Community Corrections contract rate is less than the Umatilla County Addictions Program's cost to provide services and less than the Medicaid/OHP rate schedule. The funds used to cover the remaining costs are from state-county shared services Service Element 66.*

Intensive Community-Based Treatment and Support (services to children with high-level psychiatric needs)

Wraparound*, inpatient and residential referrals, mentoring, treatment foster care, crisis respite

Community Support Services (chronic care management for adults)

Pendleton and Milton-Freewater: Peer mentors, peer-directed services and Warm Line, 24-hour crisis support and crisis respite, education and skills training, supported housing* at Hill Top House, medication management*, case management, individual therapy, psychiatric sitters

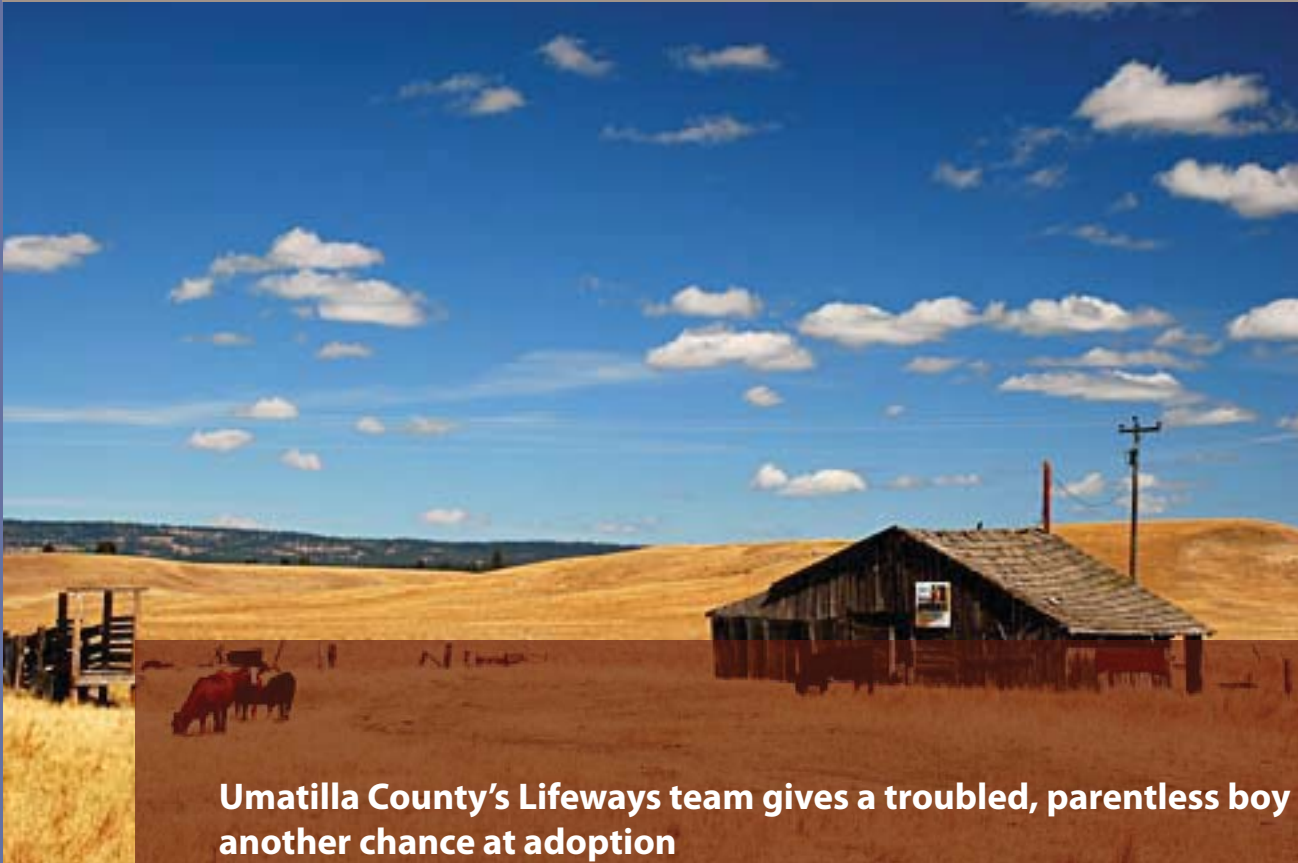

Umatilla County's Lifeways team gives a troubled, parentless boy another chance at adoption

"Matt" had been taken from his home and back again several times. He was about to be reduced to half days at Weston Elementary because of his behavior issues. He was having trouble at his foster home too, wetting the bed every night. His foster parents put him in respite care frequently just so they could cope and avoid placing him in residential treatment. When Umatilla County's Lifeways team was able to transition Matt to a therapeutic foster home instead, things began to turn around. The next school year Matt's behavior issues were nearly gone and his grades improved. Matt is now a member of his school football team. He has come a long way with the coordinated work of his skills trainer, one-on-one counseling and the security of a therapeutic foster home. With everyone working together toward one goal, he has gone from a child who was deemed "not adoptable" and headed for a treatment center, to being put back on an adoption search. Matt would not have progressed this way in a treatment center. His need for more personal attention was met by his community-based treatment team.

An ongoing relationship between a Community Mental Health Program and its customers ensures just the right amount of care for people to stay safe and stable in their own homes and avoid costly and traumatic stays in hospitals and residential programs.

I sometimes need regular help to get through manias where I lose touch with reality. Because of Lifeways I have been able to live independently with my longtime friend. Lifeways is helpful for medication management for us and a “home base.”
