Addictions Services

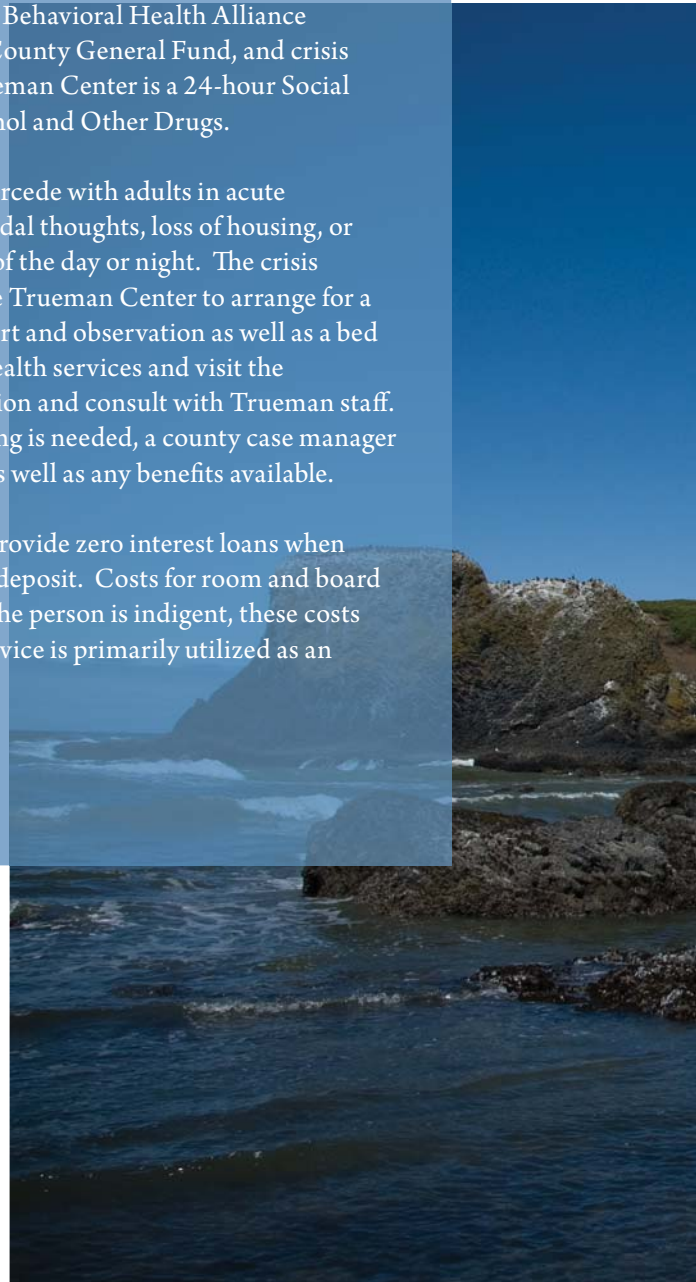

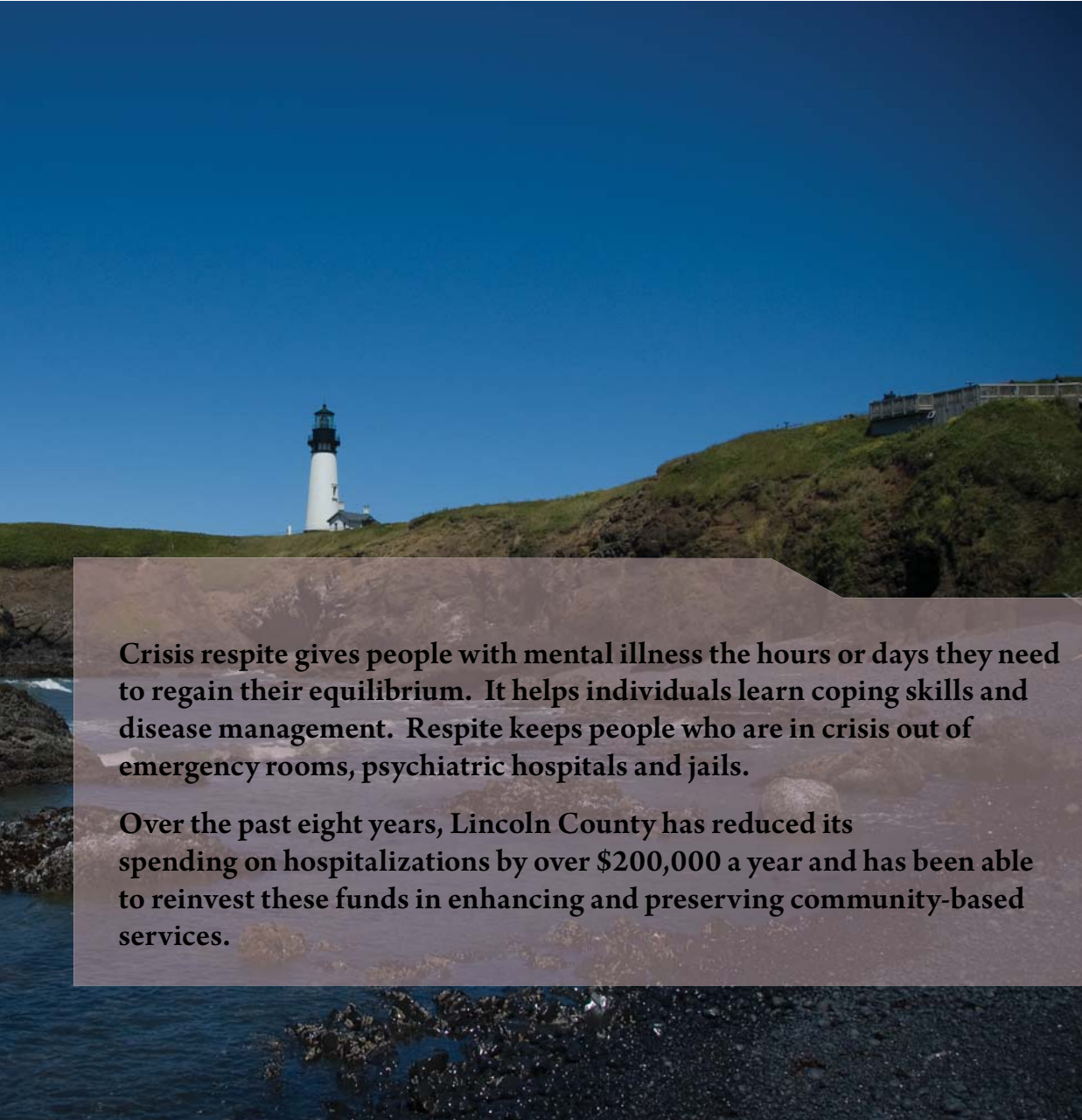
Lincoln County Mental Health teams up with local non-profit to maximize resources and keep the community safe

Lincoln County Mental Health, in partnership with the Ken Trueman Recovery Center, has developed a Crisis Respite program for adults experiencing psychiatric crisis. The program has operated for nearly 5 years using blended funds from Accountable Behavioral Health Alliance (ABHA), the Mid-Valley Regional Acute Care Council, Lincoln County General Fund, and crisis funding from the Addictions & Mental Health Division. The Trueman Center is a 24-hour Social Detox Program operated by the Lincoln County Council on Alcohol and Other Drugs.

The County Mental Health Crisis Team is frequently asked to intercede with adults in acute psychiatric crisis due to traumatic events, lack of medication, suicidal thoughts, loss of housing, or other exacerbation of their condition. This can occur at any time of the day or night. The crisis worker assesses the individual, and when appropriate, contacts the Trueman Center to arrange for a bed. Trueman staff are briefed on the situation and provide support and observation as well as a bed and meals. County crisis workers arrange for additional mental health services and visit the individual at the Trueman Center at least daily to assess the situation and consult with Trueman staff. Individuals may stay at the program for up to 2 weeks and if housing is needed, a county case manager is assigned to assist the individual in locating affordable housing as well as any benefits available.

Lincoln County Mental Health has developed a rotating fund to provide zero interest loans when needed to cover the cost of first and last months rent and security deposit. Costs for room and board are paid by ABHA if the person is on the Oregon Health Plan. If the person is indigent, these costs are paid by the Mid-Valley Regional Acute Care Council. This service is primarily utilized as an alternative to psychiatric hospitalization.





Crisis respite gives people with mental illness the hours or days they need to regain their equilibrium. It helps individuals learn coping skills and disease management. Respite keeps people who are in crisis out of emergency rooms, psychiatric hospitals and jails.

Over the past eight years, Lincoln County has reduced its spending on hospitalizations by over \$200,000 a year and has been able to reinvest these funds in enhancing and preserving community-based services.
